2014 MISSIONARY REPORT

From Our Missionary in the South: Bruce Wilcox

We continued to be blessed in 2014 in this work that the Lord has made us a part of, along with so many other brothers and sisters who are using their time and many different gifts and abilities in opportunities the Lord gives to minister His love in all kinds of ways, both to one another in the churches as well as to the unchurched and unbelievers from every social and ethnic background around us.

From grassroots community outreach programs like Kids Space and Teen Space which also include cooking meals for everyone, to musical community coffeehouses, to ministry at rodeos, a garlic festival, putting on community Christmas pageants, weekly Bible study, seniors' ministries, hospital visitation and care for the sick and dying, the prayer warriors, doing dishes, cleaning floors, fundraising, baking goodies every week, auto mechanical help, plowing the snow, cutting the grass, shopping and transportation for those unable, and a host of other encouragements and bearing of one another's burdens that fulfill the law of Christ.

As I write this, Dave and Linda Webber are in the midst of processing big changes in their lives as they step into retirement from many of the more specific routines and kinds of ministry they have been doing here for so many years, and into some much needed and deserved rest.

As I ponder the house churches and other worshipping communities of faith and outreach ministries scattered all over the place from Punchaw to Bridge Lake, many of which you will read something about in this newsletter, I'm reminded that it all really began as the result of something like "a nagging cough that just wouldn't go away", as Dave himself has described it. Something that started so

"small", with just a couple of people over 25 years ago, when God planted this calling, this dream, this vision in Dave and Linda's hearts, to minister the love of Christ to people in rural and remote areas in the Cariboo-Chilcotin who were beyond the reach of the traditional Church. And these rural areas can include entire villages that these days seem to be experiencing more and more the disappearance of any kind of visible or organized Christian witness that once upon a time was there for some of them. The harvest here is still very plentiful.

And what Dave and Linda knew then, the rest of us who have been called to be part of this know now; that this heart's desire and this vision was God-given, à la Psalm 37:4, meaning that this vision was inevitably "in synch" with God's will and His desires in the first place.

So we want to pay tribute and to honour and thank Dave and Linda Webber for their many years of faithful dedication and hard work here, in season and out of season, through the smooth times, if there ever was such a thing, and through the trials and difficult times. And the leadership, wisdom, encouragement and valuable teaching and mentoring of so many of us along the way. And we want to thank God for His vision and the gifts He has given them, and that Dave and Linda can say, as the Apostle Paul did before King Agrippa, that "I was not disobedient to the vision from heaven" (Acts 26:19).

And in light of this, I want to remind and encourage all of us that God has a plan and a vision for every single one of us in Christ! He wants to use us ordinary people in extraordinary ways. Let's be praying always, just as Paul did, to "be filled with the knowledge of His will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding" (Col 1:9). In other words let's respond

to that “nagging cough” that only comes from Him and which is the part He has in mind for us within the context of His word, His body, and the Great Commission Jesus gave His people in the first place in Matthew 28.

And let us keep in mind also that if something comes from the Lord and not us, it may not always be exactly comfortable or even welcome to us at first; but as long as we are surrendered, willing and available to Him, He will make it work, He will give it a life of its own, He will grant the increase, in His perfect time and in His strength, which is made perfect in our weakness.

When Moses was told to take off his shoes at the burning bush because it was holy ground, could it be that God was also reminding Moses there that *He* was going to actually be the one to do it . . . but in Moses’ shoes? “The One who calls you is faithful, and He will do it” (1Thess 5:24 NIV). Through Christ in us, God is “in our shoes” in every place we set our feet! May His will continue to be done in every part of this mission and through all of us wherever we are.

A huge thank you to everyone here and across the country who has become part of the Lord’s work here with us, through your prayers, gifts and support. We are always in need of that, and confident the Lord will enable all of us to carry on His vision and work here through all of you, as we totally depend on His agenda, sufficiency and Grace. Our prayers are for His richest blessings on you all!

From Our Missionaries in the North: Jon Wyminga

The year 2014 was one of several significant milestones in this mission here in the Cariboo. 2014 marked 25 years since the Cariboo House Church Ministry began, way back in 1989. As such it also marked 25 years since Dave and Linda Webber began their dedicated and sacrificial here. 2014 also marked 20 years since Shannon and I arrived on the scene, having joined this ministry when it was only five years old. What a whirlwind of adventure it has been since then.

The year 2014 was also one of significant transitions and losses. Two of our elders passed into God’s presence in 2014. Paul Mathura had served as a faithful elder in Lac la Hache until he moved to Prince George several years ago. He passed away on July 6. I still remember running into him from time to time after he moved to Prince George. We would have our kids in tow, who were still quite young, and Paul would insist on taking us out to lunch. The

second elder we lost in 2014 was Mary Krajczar, who passed away on October 6. I’m not exactly sure when Mary started serving as an elder because I wasn’t even in the Cariboo at the time. She was, I believe, the first elder to be elected from among the house churches and she was firmly in place by the time Shannon and I came in 1994 with our daughter Shelby, who was one year old at the time. We felt graciously welcomed to the Cariboo by Mary and her husband Ernie, even though they were away on holidays when we arrived. While they were gone they let us to stay in their home while we got settled in Williams Lake. What a blessing that was!

2014 was also the year the session (our meeting of church elders) and the presbytery (the meeting of other Presbyterian Church representatives in our region) granted Shannon and me a four month leave of absence which we took in the fall. After 20 years in the Cariboo we felt we needed a time of rest and refreshment, particularly in light of the transitions that were yet to come. The biggest of those transitions was that we were expecting 2014 to be the last full year that Dave and Linda Webber would serve as stipend receiving missionaries in the Cariboo. Though they plan to formally retire in March, they actually finished in early January, having accumulated quite a bit of unused vacation time. We are all deeply grateful to them and to God for their 25 years of dedicated and faithful service. We have been richly blessed by them and we wish them God’s riches blessings in their retirement.

Some communities in the northern Cariboo have also faced significant changes in 2014; changes that have had an impact on the part of our ministry we call *The Nazko and Area Dakelh Outreach*. First Nations elder Rosie Cassam, once a host to our Nazko house church before she moved away, was admitted to a nursing home in Quesnel in 2014. The First Nations villages of Red Bluff (*Lhtako*), Nazko (*Ndazk’oh*) and Kluskus (*Lhoozk’uz*) together lost five elders in the fall of 2014, followed by a sixth in January and a seventh in February of 2015: significant losses of much loved elders in such a short time. Many are still dealing with the grief.

Yet we carry on with the mission we believe God has called us to from our very beginnings back in 1989: “to reach out with the love of Jesus Christ to people who live beyond the traditional church in the rural and remote areas of the Cariboo-Chilcotin region.” And we have certainly appreciated everyone’s involvement and support. Even though I’ve just done a lot of “remembering what lies

behind”, I am reminded of the words of the apostle Paul in the book of Philippians: “*forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I*

press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus” (Philippians 3:13-14). In 2015 may we all press on together!

Clerk of Session Report: Penny McIntosh

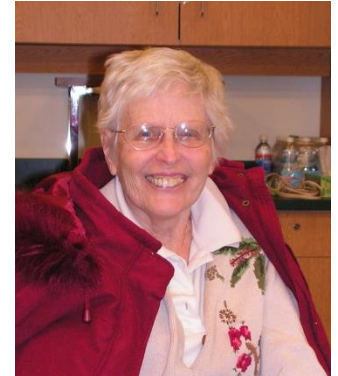

Nazko Kids' Bible Class: Shannon Bell

It was definitely a vegetarian year in Bible Class in 2014. Throughout the year we watched a number of *VeggieTales* movies all based on Bible stories. However, we did eat meat for our snacks most days! The kids loved the characters; however I don't think that I will repeat this approach with our kids' ministry. I think it became confusing to sort out what was embellished and what was true to the original stories and didn't give the kids the best understanding of the Bible. While my own daughters loved *VeggieTales* and the clever puns and humour, they were very familiar with the original Bible stories so it was just a matter of making what they knew into something fun. When we work with unchurched children who aren't intensely knowledgeable about the Bible, I think we do a disservice in presenting the stories just as they are on the films. It was a learning experience. This year we will go back to what has become our tradition of telling the stories and having the kids act out them as I tell them. It gives them the chance to experience the stories with more than just their ears. They become the characters and remember the stories to a greater degree. If you have been the little girl that Jesus raised from the dead, you will remember the whole story on many levels. We look forward to sharing some of the parables of Jesus in the coming months.

Christmas gifts for the kids in the Ndazkoh and Lhoosk'uz villages were postponed this year because Jon and I were on a leave of absence until the end of December. Early in January we gathered faithful volunteers and had our annual wrapping party and delivered New Year's gifts instead. Many thanks to all those who collected and donated toys, clothes, books, school supplies, toiletries, jewelry and other gifts. Thanks to our faithful sewers in Cranbrook for the beautiful gift bags and to the many gifted hands that knit, knit, and knit all the warm cosy hats, mitts, socks, sweaters etc.

Kluskus (Lhooskuz): Jon Wyminga

Ink'ez yugha hoodul'eh ndo bulhni, "Nuwheni do, ndan 'ust'ah dahni?" 'Et Peter 'utni, "Nyun Christ, 'unint'oh."

What was that? What's with the gibberish? Was it some kind of computer malfunction or something? Well, you may not understand this passage but Bella and Marlene did when I read it to them in Kluskus (Lhoozk'uz) last week; at least if I didn't butcher the pronunciation in the process. These words are from Mark 8:29 in the Southern Carrier (Dakelh) translation of the New Testament. They come at the centermost point in the gospel. Before that everyone is desperately trying to figure out who Jesus is. Even his own disciples don't seem to understand him. But here they finally get it. Well, sort of! They end up spending the rest of the gospel trying to figure out what it all means, because it seems to mean something very different to Jesus.

Understanding the message of Jesus is hard enough if it's spoken in your own language and through your own culture. But what if it comes through a foreign language and a foreign culture? It sounds like gibberish. And it can result in major missionary malfunctions. I've heard about a lot of them over the years.

I continue to visit the First Nations village of Kluskus every other week or so. I drop in at the school, I visit in people's homes and I try to attend special community events; each time seeking to manifest the presence and love of Jesus Christ within the context of the culture of Kluskus. It's not always easy. Beneath the surface I can tell a lot of people have heard their share of gibberish. Sometimes they've even been victimized by devastating missionary malfunctions. And goodness knows I may speak gibberish of my own at times, with my butchered pronunciation and all. Yet I continue to trust that the Lord will take these meager efforts, which seem as small as a mustard seed, and use them to grow the kingdom. I'd like to thank John Noble and Dave McNab for visiting the village once while I was away on leave. And I'd like to ask for your ongoing prayers for the community and people of Kluskus. I know they would appreciate prayer too. They for it all the time.
