Some Ministry and House Church Reports

Transitions in the Cariboo: Shannon Bell-Wyminga

Change is inevitable – except in vending machines. Since the mission of the Cariboo is not a vending machine, we can expect that we will go



through changes. This ministry from its inception has been about constant change. House churches grow; people grow up, move away or pass on; the faces in the living room come and go; some churches cease while others multiply. Those of us who

have been a part of this ministry over the past decades can look back and see with wonder how things have changed, grown and developed over those years. Only a few of us have been around since the beginning. (I can count them on my fingers!) One of the biggest changes is what we have experienced in the past few months - this ministry moving forward without the leadership of David and Linda Webber. It is a tribute to their hard work that the mission of the Cariboo Presbyterian Church has not changed, but continues to be lived out in various forms all over the region. We will continue to shift, transform and grow as we walk forward together to carry forth God's vision given to the Webbers.

We have much to celebrate in the transition time. Two house churches in Williams Lake now meet and carry out their ministries with their own leadership, not requiring one of the full-time pastors to keep things going. Bruce Wilcox has been called out of volunteer ministry to full-time work among us, bringing his many gifts, fulfilling the vision of raising up local leadership from among the people of the congregation. Members of each house church

participate faithfully in their own unique ways, serving the mission of Christ in each community.

This time also presents us with challenges. We have the opportunity within the Presbyterian Church in Canada to help the church as a whole begin to grapple with how to incorporate lay missionaries and other leaders into the decision-making structures of the church. This is beginning with the commissioning of elders to lead us in the sacraments but needs to go much further as more and more churches in the future will need to consider how to be the church without a full time paid minister.

As we move from a year and a half of having three full-time ministers back to having two, we will need to consider how to ensure that all the work that has been done in the past can continue to be done effectively and efficiently.

Financially we will continue to rely on the support of every member of the congregation as well as our faithful supporters in many other places. With this transition, the grant we have received from Presbyterians Sharing through Canadian Ministries for the Cariboo ministry position (now Bruce Wilcox) has been decreased this year to \$11,500 from \$20,000 in previous years. This is a significant reduction which we trust that God will help us to make up for. The full grant for Jon and I for Native ministries remains the same.

While we celebrate with the Webbers their time of rest and retirement, we are all called to journey together into the future, asking God what we might be called to do so that this mission of Christ can continue in the process of change and growth. What new thing might the Lord show you? What aspect of ministry will you be led to move into? What new way can you reach out to those in your community with the love of Christ? There is always

pain with change, but we are kingdom builders. The Bible often describes the coming of the kingdom like



a woman in labour.
There is pain and hard work, but the results are spectacular! I started with a quote so will finish with one: *If nothing ever changed, there'd be no butterflies*.

Ts'ekookoh Dakelh 'Unzoo Weekend (Beautiful Dakelh Women Weekend): Shannon Bell-Wyminga

Beautiful Dakelh women. We have many of them in Ndazkoh, but not all are aware much of the

time of the beauty that the Creator put in these precious daughters. A weekend away was just the thing to encourage and affirm these women from our community. May 1-3, 2015 took twelve of us from Ndazkoh and



two speakers to Ness Lake Bible Camp where we booked Founder's Cottage for the weekend. We left behind the worries and cares of family and community and work to listen to Dr. Cheryl Bear and Pastor Christina Dawson share the love of the Creator with us all. Cheryl is an internationally known singer, song-writer, pastor and author who is proud of her Dakelh heritage. She is a band councilor with the Nadleh band (west of Prince George) and part of Street Church in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside where her husband Randy Barnetson is the pastor. Christina is the associate pastor of Street Church and comes from the Tla-o-qui-aht First Nation on Vancouver Island.

Cheryl and Christina shared stories and scriptures that honoured the beautiful culture of the

First Nations. Cheryl recounted some of her memories of the teachings of her grandmothers and aunties which line up with so many of the teachings of the Old Testament. She talked about cleansing ceremonies and pointed us to the cleansing that comes to us in Jesus. Christina shared experiences of how God has spoken to her and guided her in her life. She shared her regalia with the group as did Cheryl, both expressing the importance of their families and identity as First Nations women.

The weekend wasn't all just listening as we played games, did crafts and ate way too much of the continual meals provided by the camp. Good thing we had to walk to get to the dining hall! Our worship was enhanced as many of us joined together around the big drum lifting our voices in words and chant that glorified Jesus.

And we prayed! We had the privilege of seeing God answer prayer on the Saturday evening. We received word that there had been a serious vehicle accident involving three young men from our community. One of them was reported to be unconscious and unresponsive. His mother and grandmother were both with us at camp. We prayed for them before I drove them the two hours back to Quesnel to the hospital. We prayed and talked on the drive as well. When we got to the hospital we learned that this young man was ready to be released with only a broken arm and cracked ribs! The driver had to be sent for surgery in Prince George with a crushed hip and the other passenger had a bumped face. We all rejoiced in how our Creator had saved their lives.

We were grateful to be able to spend this weekend away together hearing about God's wonderful love for us as women. It was so important that our women could know that the Creator loves them as Dakelh women, affirming the good things in their culture and traditions that point to Jesus.

Some Words of Encouragement

God's Covenant Faithfulness: Bruce Wilcox

When we were on a recent trip to Israel we stayed for a while at the Jerusalem Hills Inn, which is, guess where . . . in the hills not too far from Jerusalem. Our gracious host shared some very interesting history with us of this particular area we were in. Called Abu Ghosh, and mostly Arab today, this was apparently also the very area of the ancient city of Gibeon.



Now there's quite a history about Gibeon, which we see in the book of Joshua, Chapter 9. These were Hivites, one of the nations that Joshua and the Israelites were commanded by God to eliminate or drive out of the land of Canaan. But they sent a delegation to Joshua pretending to have come from a distant country, with worn out wineskins and clothes, and moldy old bread. Fearing for their lives, these Gibeonites tricked Joshua and Israel into making a treaty of peace with them. And the scripture says concerning this, that Israel "did not inquire of the Lord." (Josh 9:14). So Joshua formally ratified an agreement, a covenant with these people who were well within the borders of the Promised Land. This was not in obedience to God's will at all (see Ex 34:11,12 for example) because he made the mistake in the first place of not taking the situation to the Lord.

So the interesting question about this which I believe is highly relevant to our own lives, and to our own walk with the Lord is this: because Plan "A" was messed up by Joshua, does that mean that God then has to resort to some sort of secondary, inferior Plan "B", which somehow ties His hands or hinders Him from still fully accomplishing His purposes in Joshua's life and for Israel?

Well, if we keep reading these scriptures, we see in Chapter 10 that as a direct result of this

treaty/covenant, all five of the Amorite kings of the hill country of central Canaan (including Jerusalem), gathered themselves together to fight and punish Gibeon for making peace with Joshua. And the result of that was an all-night march and then a huge Godgiven victory for Joshua over all of them in one climactic battle, which saw the Lord also rain down large hailstones, and then actually stop the sun in the sky! This is one of the greatest miracles in the Bible. "There has never been a day like it before or since..." (Josh 10:14), when Joshua said in the sight of Israel: "Sun, stand still over Gibeon..."

I find this immensely encouraging to remember when I mess up. And I hope you do too, because let's face it, we all mess up, and sometimes royally! But the beautiful thing about God's sovereignty and control is His amazing patience, grace, love and perfect wisdom for us within that. It's like His Plan "A" is always being accomplished, one way or another, for us who love Him, because even if we are not always faithful, He is always faithful, "for he cannot deny (or disown) Himself", as the Scripture also says.

Something else very intriguing about this story is that even though this covenant was originally a "mistake", God still took it very seriously and expected Israel to honour it, not only after it was first made, but even hundreds of years later! In 2 Samuel Chapter 21 we see a famine had been happening for three years in Israel during the reign of David. Why? Because some years earlier King Saul had broken that agreement with the Gibeonites by trying to annihilate them. The land was only healed when David allowed the Gibeonites to avenge themselves through seven of Saul's descendants.

So here's the thing: if the Lord takes a "manmade" bilateral covenant this seriously, then how much more absolutely infallible and iron-clad is any covenant that *God Himself* unilaterally initiates and makes by His grace? And therefore how much more totally guaranteed is our security and salvation forever in His hands, in His New Covenant which has been eternally written for us from the foundation of the world in the blood of Christ (God) Himself!

So we can take heart. No matter what this world throws at us, and even in the face of our mistakes and many imperfections, the Lord keeps reworking the clay - and never into something inferior,

but only somehow more and more into the image of Christ.

One last intriguing thing . . . our host at the Jerusalem Hills Inn that evening happened to mention that the predominately Arab population of the Abu Ghosh area today get along better with the Jews, are more co-operative and supportive and join the Israeli Defense Force in greater numbers than the Arabs anywhere else in Israel! Makes you wonder if that's just a coincidence, or is something else still at play there.

<u>Musing on *The Diary of Anne Frank*:</u> Gordon Kellett

"Think of all the beauty around you and be happy."

"I want to go on living after my death, and therefore I am grateful to God for giving me this gift . . . of expressing all that is in me."

The above quotations are from *The Diary of Anne Frank*, who lived from 1929-1945. Anne Frank has been one of my heroines ever since I read her diary as a teenager. The diary is the chronicle of a young Jewish girl who spent over two years hiding in an Amsterdam attic with her father, mother, sister and four others in Nazi-occupied Holland during WW2. It is also the story of the couple who hid them and daily risked their lives to do so.

But it is mostly the story of a brilliant young teenager on her journey to womanhood. Despite living in constant fear of discovery, Anne's writings reveal a young woman of hope, faith, curiosity and courage. And beliefs that she never lost. Sadly, Anne did not live to fulfill her promise and her dreams. At age 15, she died in Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in 1945. Everyone else in that attic also perished, except her Father. Her diary was first published in English in 1952, and has been read by teenagers and many others around the world in over fifty languages.

It had a profound effect on me as a young man and it continues to do so. I have never forgotten the feelings of hope and faith that Anne expressed, and they inspire me to this day. It has been fifty years since I read it, but it continues to remind me of how blessed I am, and that faith and hope remain constant no matter what circumstances we find ourselves in.

After Jesus died on the cross for our salvation He overcame death and rose from the grave. Before He ascended to His Father He gave His apostles a commission to spread the gospel to the whole world. He also promised to stay with them (and us) to the end of the age, and to the ends of the earth. Jesus has kept that promise. No matter what befalls us, He never leaves us. I believe that He was with Anne and her family and friends throughout their terrible ordeal and its outcome, and is with us through all our lives as well. He is Risen!

Some Recipes

Israeli Salad

This is a famous vegetable salad from Israel. Israel has very good vegetables and the assortment makes it unique.

Ingredients:

- 2 tomatoes, chopped
- 2 cucumbers, peeled and chopped
- 1 green pepper, seeded and chopped
- 1/4 cup fresh parsley, finely chopped
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- juice from 1 lemon
- 4 tablespoons olive oil
- salt
- nepper
- optional: zaatar (hyssop spice)

Preparation:

- 1. In a serving bowl, combine chopped vegetables. Toss gently.
- 2. In a small bowl, combine lemon juice, olive oil, and salt and pepper (to taste). Drizzle over vegetables and toss. Serve immediately or cover and refrigerate for up to 2 days.

Real Potato Leek Soup

Ingredients:

Original recipe makes 8 servings

- small red new potatoes
- 6 cups chicken broth
- 3 leeks, chopped
- 6 pieces of cooked bacon chopped
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 2 cups mild
- salt and pepper to taste

Preparation takes 30 minutes.

Cooks in 45 minutes.

Ready in 1 hour and 30 minutes.

Directions:

- 1. Place potatoes into a large saucepan with water to cover. Bring to a boil and cook until tender. Meanwhile, saute leeks in butter until translucent.
- 2. When potatoes are done, skin them while they are still hot and cut them into bite sized pieces. Place potatoes into a stock pot with chicken broth, bacon and leeks. Season with salt and pepper. Cook over medium heat until simmering, then remove from heat and stir in milk. Serve immediately.

Falafel (Chick-pea Patties)

Falafel is sold on street corners in every city and town in Israel. Some call it the "Israeli hamburger." Its popularity can be attributed in no small part to the Yemenite Jews who have brought a particularly tasty version onto the culinary scene. Students living on a meager budget consume full-portion falafels in whole pitas on the sidewalks as their noon "dinner." Ingredients:

- 1 lb. canned chick-peas (drained)
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 2 tbs. finely chopped parsley
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 to 1 cup breadcrumbs or fine bulgur
- 1 tsp. ground coriander or cumin
- 1 tsp. dried hot peppers
- 1 tsp. garlic powder
- vegetable oil (for frying)

Preparation:

Combine chick-peas with onion. Add parsley, lightly beaten egg and spices. Mix in blender. Add breadcrumbs until mixture forms a small ball without

sticking to your hands. Form chick-pea mixture into small balls about the size of a quarter (one inch in diameter). Flatten patties slightly and fry until golden brown on both sides. Drain falafel balls on paper towels. Serve individually with toothpicks as an hors d'oeuvre or as a sandwich filling with chopped tomato, cucumber, radish, lettuce, onion, hummus and/or tehina inside pita bread. Makes about 24 falafel balls.

Avocado, Tomato & Feta Dip


Ingredients:

- 2 large avocados (diced)
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes (diced)
- 1/2 red onion (diced)
- 3/4 cups crumbled feta cheese
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon red wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons fresh chopped parsley

Directions:

- 1. Combine all the ingredients together in a large bowl.
- 2. Serve with tortilla chips.
